HVS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Hurst Village Society says goodbye to popular Chairman

At the AGM held on 29th February 2008, we regretfully said goodbye to Janet Spiller. For the past year, she was a charming and dedicated chairman. She was a committee member for 15 years and was invaluable with her knowledge of environment matters.

Committee changes

The Committee also lost the services of David Bingham as Treasurer, who had been on the committee for many years, serving as our able Treasurer. David Fraser is to take over his role.

We are fortunate to have four new members joining the committee: John Farrant, Maria Land, Jonathan Norris, and Gisela Sharpe. Congratulations to them and we look forward to their useful contributions. The committee is working vigorously on the most important task of the Village Society, which is to defend the village from the threat of high-density urban development

Jonathan Norris has taken on the role of Planning from Barbara Johnson, who over the past year handled this complicated issue with meticulous efficiency.

'Hurst - one of the few remaining villages in the Borough'

Keynote address

Councillor Annette Drake was not able to be present - the first AGM she had missed since the 1970s. Wayne Smith gave the keynote address on her behalf.

The most important issue that Councillor Drake raised was the threat to the village from development. 'We must always bear in mind that we are one of the few remaining villages in the Borough.' She reminded us that the HVS was formed to work with the Parish Council to counter the threat from development in Hurst.

Among the issues we have to deal with this coming year are:

- Sandford Farm application for 800 housing units and 150 extra care homes
- A strategy for dealing with the planning issues to be discussed by the new committee
- The enforcements on Keyersbridge and Pond View
- Traffic speeds in Lodge Road, Davis Street and Wokingham Road. Councillor Drake said that she was sure that villagers living on those roads would be willing to sign a petition. She could present the petitions at Full Council, which would quickly bring the matter to the attention of the members of the Council.

HURST TAKES ACTION

ROAD SAFETY IN OUR VILLAGE

Urgent action is needed to address our traffic and road problems

A meeting hosted by the Parish Council and Hurst Village Society was held in May with Glyn Wildey of Twyford Police Station (Thames Valley Police) and Annette Drake, Hurst's Councillor at Wokingham Borough Council. Much was discussed, and the following concrete actions were agreed:

- A Speed Indication Device (SID) will be deployed in Hurst sometime over the next couple of weeks (for obvious reasons, date and location will not be publicised). This is a mobile unit to measure speed and although it doesn't lead to prosecution, it is a deterrent.
- We will be gathering a petition, which Annette Drake will present at full Council. The Council will have a duty to consider and report back on the concerns raised and cannot simply ignore it. I shall be contacting people to ask for their help going door to door to collect signatures - please help if you can.
- The Parish Council will be looking at speed related signage in the village and investigating with the Traffic Management Officer of TVP as to what can be done. The effectiveness of the Vehicle Activate Signs is already being addressed.
- Investigations into 20mph speed limits along School Road are being undertaken.

HURST TAKES ACTION

PLANNING NEWS - LUFF FARMS

The continuing threat from development is ever present, with concerns that tactical and commercially motivated planning applications will result in brownfield development opportunities, which will irreparably transform the character of Hurst.

This is particularly apparent with respect to the Field between Lodge Road, Martineau Lane and Tape Lane, which since 1986 has been more the subject of planning applications and appeals founded on commercial developments and some form of residential requirement than any farming activity. It is therefore hardly surprising that we find ourselves yet again responding to a new planning application (F/2008/1017) and an appeal (F/2007/2154).

As at the time of writing, HVS has already launched a campaign to raise objections to the new planning application and hope that many of you will have made your views known to WBC by the 11 June deadline.

We do however now also need to ensure that we support WBC's refusal of F/2007/2154 "Proposed erection of stables and barn to form equine treatment centre with ménage, access and horse walkers. Storage building for tree nursery" by writing to the Planning Inspector and reinforcing the basis of refusal with your own comments.

The basis of the refusal can be found in full on the Wokingham Borough Council website www.wokingham.gov.uk, but in summary the reasons were as follows:

- O Due to its size and scale, the development of the site was considered to have a harmful impact to the visual character and open nature of the countryside.

 HVS comment: This is a recurrent view that Planning Inspectors have made with regard to 'lesser' proposals that have also been the subject of an appeal. The new planning application is no different and if anything is more extensive with additional buildings.
- O Unproven need for commercial development in an unsustainable location.
 - HVS comment: One can but presume that the absence of a business plan is testimony to its relevancy to the applicant. History has it that the preferred outcome in 1986 would have been 177 dwellings. Since then, the quest to gain some form of residential status has been ever present in a succession of planning applications. In this instance, why would a tree nursery equipment storage building require an entrance hall with cupboard, WC, kitchen & shower room plus three other rooms?

The new planning application, whilst supported by a business plan, lacks financial credibility or proven business justification.

LUFF FARMS continued

Inadequate safe access and impact of increased traffic in Lodge Road.

HVS comment: There was no infrastructure impact assessment.

The new planning application, whilst supported by a traffic assessment, oddly enough agrees that site access is inadequate and suggests that there will be less traffic movement!

Increased risk of flooding and water contamination.

HVS comment: There was no environmental impact assessment.

The new planning application is supported by a flood risk assessment but does not adequately address drainage issues. Sewage disposal is also not adequately addressed in the planning application.

Impact of development on Crested Newts.

HVS comment: There was no ecological or environmental impact assessment. The new planning application is supported by a newt assessment but in the absence of stormwater drainage or sewerage details, it does not convey how the habitat of newts will be protected.

In urging you to write now in support of the Council's refusal of F/2007/2154, it is anticipated that the new documentation presented with the latest planning application may be retrospectively presented by Luff Farms in order to counteract the grounds for refusal.

You may therefore wish to consider including your comments on the adequacy of the new documentation presented in support of the latest planning application – notably the impact on the rural scene, the adequacy of the business plan (including financial viability and business justification), transport, neighbourhood and environmental impact. Your comments do not need to be limited to WBC's reason for refusal

Documents relating to the appeal may be inspected in the Planning Services Department at the Civic Offices. Shute End, Wokingham during normal office hours.

ROAD SAFETY IN OUR VILLAGE

From a pedestrian's point of view

Please remember that Tape Lane is an access only road - which means you can only use the way to access properties along it, not as a convenient short cut when School Road is busy! The road is part of a 'safer route to school', used by young children walking, scooting and cycling to school.

Please also remember that parking on pavements obstructs the way for pedestrians. It may protect your wing mirrors, but it places the pedestrians at risk from the traffic you are trying to avoid. You really cannot put a price on a life, so please also ask your visitors to park considerately.

Finally, if every resident in Hurst were to stick to the 30 and 40 village speed limits, especially along Lodge Road and the Wokingham Road, we could help slow down through traffic. After all, if we don't stick to these limits, we can hardly be surprised when other traffic ignores them and our village becomes a grand prix circuit.

REVAMP FOR DINTON PASTURES

In order to improve the amenities at Dinton Pastures, Wokingham Borough Council have accepted the proposal of refurbishing the existing facilities. This was one of three options put forward for their consideration.

The first option, which was supported by the Hurst Parish Council, was to knock down the existing visitor centre, golf clubhouse and sailing clubhouse and rebuild new state-of-the-art facilities on one of two proposed locations.

The decision was a great disappointment to Wayne Smith, Chairman of Hurst Parish Council, who said that the current facilities are in such small buildings. "Even if they are extended, you are not going to get facilities that go with a country park. For us, option one was the clear winner."

HURST FOOTBALL CLUB - THE EARLY YEARS

Greg Neall and Iain Perry have been delving into the history of the Hurst Football Club, which they discovered goes back at least a hundred years.

The records with the Reading League indicate that Hurst Football Club was founded in 1928, although this appears to be when the earliest form of the current local league was established and all original member clubs seem to have this date as their official founding year.

Anecdotal evidence in Hurst would suggest otherwise. A number of other clubs in the area, which regularly battle it out every Saturday afternoon between September and May, have discovered that they have been running for longer than official records.

So our curiosity took us to Reading Library and the archive of the Reading Mercury newspaper that reported diligently on local football for many years.

What the newspapers say

The earliest record of a match we have found was on Saturday, 17th February 1906, when Hurst was beaten 2 goals to 1 by Twyford. Our researches have revealed details of matches with local clubs until the Great War and we are continuing to bring the records up to date. Names of local residents are also starting to make an appearance, which makes the search more exciting.

In a period before widespread radio or television, it seems association football provided not only regular entertainment and competition for young men in the area, but an event worthy of local news coverage and village gossip.

Have you any stories for our records?

If anyone has any memories or stories of the football team in Hurst then we would be pleased to meet you and record them for posterity. Our fond regards and best wishes go out to Mr John Whitfield, who at 83 is thought to be the oldest resident of the village to have taken the field for Hurst Football Club.

We are committed to filling in more of the gaps to the Club's history although this is quite a slow process and it has taken six months just to compile this small record. PENALTIES FOR FLY-TIPPING

Information from the website of the Wokingham Borough Council

Fly-tipping is a criminal offence and can lead to prosecution with fines of up to £20,000 or six months' imprisonment. The sentence may be more severe if the case is considered at Crown Court or the waste is hazardous.

Report it

Fly-tipped rubbish can be dangerous as a hazard to the public and the environment if it enters the water courses. If you see any dumped rubbish in Wokingham Borough, use the online fly-tipping report form to let us know the location so that we can clean up the area. http://www.wokingham.gov.uk/community-living/community-safety/fly-tipping-share

If you see any person fly-tipping, report it. Do not approach the rubbish or any individuals carrying out fly-tipping. Make a note of:

Date, time and place

The amount of rubbish and what it looks like

Description of any vehicles involved and their registration numbers

Descriptions of any person or people carrying out the act
