Bus route changes

Information has just been received on changes to the bus routes.

Service 128 will have a regular hourly off-peak timetable [two-hourly on Saturdays].

Between Winnersh and Wokingham, most buses will run direct via Reading Road instead of via Emmbrook village.

There will be an additional bus from Reading [at 18.20] and Twyford [18.52] Monday to Friday.

Wokingham Borough Council is considering installing bus stops and timetables in the village in response to comments from residents. If you agree, please let me have your views on this proposal.

TRAFFIC MATTERS

THERE were three car accidents in Lodge Road in just one September week. Luckily no one was hurt – but it is a timely reminder that we need to keep up the pressure to try and make Hurst safer.

Traffic petition

Cllr Annette Drake presented the traffic petition to Wokingham Borough Council on 25th September and their response is reported in this Newsletter in *The View from Shute End* and *Parish Council News*. Thank you to all who signed or who collected signatures. Of course, we do not think this is the immediate solution to our problem.

More can be done

To move things along, there are a few things you can help with. First of all, we want to collect ideas about how road safety can be improved in Hurst – where extra signs are needed, which speed limits need changing, where a pavement could be improved. We want to have a road-by-road wish list of constructive ideas to take forward to the Council. Please either visit the village forum (www.WoodedHill.org) to post your ideas or email them to liz@chaderton.com.

The second thing is to drive slowly through the village. Apparently a number of years ago, a speed check was carried out and 60% of those stopped were from Hurst. If we all drive at the right speed, we will act as a fleet of road bumps, slowing down the vehicles behind who might want to go a tad faster. I know this sometimes means you get overtaken in a 30 zone or gestured at with a few digits, but on the whole, we can damp down the speed by our own driving style.

A final thought is that if you witness an accident or incident, please report it to the police on *0845 8 505 505*. It will give a truer picture of the traffic problems in Hurst and add weight to our campaign.

HURST HORSE SHOW AND COUNTRY FAYRE

Hurst will be celebrating its 30th Horse Show and Country Fair next year and plans are already afoot for a spectacular weekend. Get the dates down in your new 2009 diary – 27th and 28th June.

This year's show was a record breaker with around 6000 visitors – beating last year's record total by a massive 50 per cent.

Chair of the show Duncan Kendall said, 'It was a huge amount of work by hundreds of local people. The show committee would like to thank everyone involved. Thousands of pounds were raised for St Nicholas Primary School, the local scout and guide movements, Wokingham Red Diamonds sports for the disabled, Hurst Pre-School, Hurst Village Halls, Berkshire Cancer Scanning Unit at the Royal Berkshire Hospital and many other groups and charities.

'The committee wants to hear Hurst people's views on this year's show and ideas for next year's. We'd also like to hear from everyone who would like to help in the organisation of it. Just contact us through the show website www.hursthorseshow.org.uk

Barbecue cook Mr Paul Squires said, 'We served 1700 burgers and 800 sausages, covered in 13 litres of tomato ketchup.' About 800 roasted pork sandwiches were sold. St Nicholas Pre-School, Hurst, sold 200 bowls of strawberries in just one day. The bar sold 1500 pints of beer, cider and lager. 1st Hurst Air Scouts served teas and coffees. St Nicholas School PTA sold more than 1000 sticks of candyfloss.

Organisers of the horse and pony events organisers were delighted with their 300 entries, a 30 per cent rise on last year.

There were new attractions such as the farmyard corner where children could stroke the animals and the go-kart derby. Other attractions included St Nicholas School choir, maypole dancers and recorder group, and Hurst Morris People.

Country crafts and pursuits included a demonstration by wheelwright, Mr Ted Fox of Charvil; and beekeeping by Mr Michael Eustace of Hurst.

What's been happening to the chestnut trees?

Many of our beautiful horse chestnut trees have been looking very unhappy over the summer, with the leaves turning brown and mottled.

The message from the Forestry Commission is that even though they may appear to be dying, they are probably still healthy.

The premature leaf loss is a result of horse chestnuts being infested with the larvae of *Cameraria ohridella*, or horse chestnut leaf miner, a moth that is spreading its wings across the southern half of England. The larvae mine within the leaves, which eventually shrivel and drop off as early as the middle of August.

Jon Matthews, Tree Officer of Wokingham Borough Council, advises that the situation is being monitored in the region and it is not estimated at this stage that there will be a long-term effect.

However, trees need to be looked after and regularly inspected. In the autumn, once all the leaves have dropped off an infested tree, they can be swept up and composted or burned. Composting is effective if the leaves are covered with a 10cm layer of soil or a 15cm layer of other plant material. This prevents the adult moths emerging the following spring. This is a reasonably effective control in individual gardens.

HURST HORTICULTURAL & COTTAGE GARDEN SOCIETY SHOW

In what has been a rather disappointing year for many outside events, thankfully the sun shone for Hurst Horticultural Show. The quantity of entries in some of the classes was slightly less than in previous years but the quality of produce was congratulated by the judges and drew many visitors to admire during the afternoon. The Waltham St Lawrence Silver Band played lustily throughout the afternoon in the Village Hall grounds among the stalls and some seventy-five dogs entered the dog show in the adjacent field, much to the delight of the organisers.

Well done children; entries were even greater than before and the children's craft area was most popular and many enjoyed the music workshop organised by Waltham St Lawrence band members.

We hope to encourage new exhibitors to enter again in 2009. HH&CGS news and meeting dates will be published in future editions of the HVS Newsletter. The first for 2009 is on 5th February in the Cricket Club.

Good work done in the village

For some time now, St. Nicholas Church has been using Community Workers to cut the grass and keep the churchyard tidy. Offenders of less serious crimes, for whom prison is not appropriate, receive a community sentence. The scheme is called community payback, where small groups of up to 10 offenders, supervised by an expert probation officer, carry out unpaid work for the community. Statistics released by the Probation Service show a 13% drop of re-offending, as a result of community sentences. Before any project is undertaken, a comprehensive assessment is done by the Probation Service, and signed off by the benefactor, to ensure the safety of offenders and the public.

Offenders get to see how they can contribute in a positive way and gain some self-respect. This is certainly true of Davis Street, and some of the other projects arranged by the Parish Council. The parking area at the Church Hill Almshouses has been weeded, and a ton of new gravel spread. The same will be done at the Hinton Road Almshouses. Also, work is about to be carried out at the Village Halls to trim back the hedges and tidy up the frontage. In November, the Community Workers will start clearing back the vegetation and painting the fences in the School Road Recreation ground.

Not only will this make the recreation ground look better, but it will also improve the safety of the users by removing hiding places where less desirable activities take place. Without the help of the Probation Service, a lot of these projects would not have been carried out due to the high cost of labour. The Parish Council is delighted with the work that has been carried out, from which the community as a whole will benefit.

Thistle storm over the Almshouses on Church Hill

During the summer, the air was thick with thistle down, which settled over the grass and plants of the Almshouses like snow. The pernicious fluff found its way into the houses and collected in every nook and cranny.

The culprit was the plot of land adjoining the Almhouses on Church Hill. This is at present being left fallow to allow for the growth of wild flowers, but the only plants to flourish are the thistles. The problem was only solved through the good offices of Paul Martin of the Parish Council who arranged with the Wokingham Borough Council for the thistles to be cut down and removed.

In response to notices posted on the Wooded Hill website, this piece of land is in the land bank of the Wokingham Borough Council. Despite a proposal by the HVS to create a community orchard, Wokingham BC have still to decide how the land should be used.

HURST ROMANS FOOTBALL CLUB

Update on the new home of Hurst Football, Stow Bridge, Hinton Road

If you haven't already done so, visit *www.hurstfc.org.uk* and click on 'Future plans'. Everything to do with this project is detailed, including the planning permission from WBC.

A committee of volunteers is in place, made up of Hinton Road residents and active Club members. All we need now is YOU.

In July, an army of volunteers responded to our 'appeal for help' at the Club AGM and de-stoned the four-acre site, armed with spade and barrows when the large surface stones were moved to improve the access at the entrance. DAVIS STREET RECREATION GROUND

Yes, there is a recreation ground in Davis Street. It consists of a triangular field, which in area is about the same as the School Road recreation ground. It has a climbing frame, a two-bay junior swing, toddler swing, basketball hoop and a football field.

As some of you may know, the Parish Council had to close the Davis Street Playing Field after receiving notification from WBC that the play equipment and the new fence installed by our neighbour were not safe. Although built in 1970, the old play equipment is very sturdy, and has a rustic charm about it. The Parish Council were therefore reluctant to remove it, which in itself would have been be costly. Quotes for a secondary fence were sought and 'Play Inspection' was recommended by WBC to assess the play equipment.

As it turned out, the biggest problem turned out to be rabbits. Having consulted with a number of experts, it was clear that we could only tackle the rabbit problem once we had cleared the undergrowth that was protecting the burrows.

Following the all clear from 'Play Inspection', Community Workers set to work rubbing down and painting the swings and climbing frame and cutting back the vegetation. Members of the Parish Council, Carlos Martin, Paul Drayton and HVS member, David Noble, chopped some of the bigger trees down. The Community Workers then finished the job, chopping the branches off ready for shredding and clearing the site of old bottles, tyres, bits of concrete, and all the usual staff you expect to find in a child's recreation ground. We are particularly indebted to Carlos Martin and his chainsaw for all the time he has spent helping us on the mammoth project.

We are now entering the final phase of the work at Davis Street. Hopefully by the time you read this, the play equipment will have been completely renovated, the trees and undergrowth shredded, and a new fence installed.

Following that meeting, Cllr Baker has already agreed to attend a Parish Council meeting to hear views and answer questions. So let us all think of innovative ways to reduce the speeding on our village road. I look forward to hearing from you.
