ST NICHOLAS CHURCHYARD

The Ministry of Justice received no representations following the publication of the notice to close the churchyard for new burials. Following the due process, the Privy Council has issued an Order in Council, which prevents new burials taking place, as the churchyard is full. It will still be possible for burials to take place in existing graves (as long as there is a sufficient depth) and for the interment of ashes.

There was concern from one visitor that the churchyard was to be closed, meaning that there would be no access! This is, obviously, not the case and anyone is very welcome to walk, sit or help maintain the graves in that peaceful place.

SAD NEWS!

The weeping lime tree in the churchyard is a prominent feature of the picturesque area surrounding the church, the Castle Inn and the Almshouses. However, experts have unfortunately discovered that the tree is suffering from a deadly fungus (*Kretzschmaria deusta*). This means that, eventually, it will have to be felled. In the short term, however, for safety reasons it will be reduced in height in order to lessen its resistance to the wind.

The Tree Officer from the Borough Council has seen the reports and inspected the tree and has given her consent for this reduction in height to take place.

I am sure we all share in the sadness of witnessing such a change to this great tree. We would, however, be even sadder if it were to fall victim to a gale and fall on one of the surrounding buildings or a passing car.

Speed Surveys continued

The Parish Council Chairman, two local residents and I met with Highway Officers and we have actually had agreement that some simple measures will be introduced, e.g. roundels painted on the roads to emphasise speed limits. The policeman who was at the meeting agreed to show his presence in uniform around the village, which served to slow the traffic speed down — for a while. Whilst this will not excite you greatly, it is a first step and we continue to negotiate with the Executive Member for Highways looking into other proposals that we put forward. We are not giving up - pressure will continue. There will be some innovative measures put in place as soon as the funds become available.

Day care services for older people

Like many other areas in the country, Wokingham has an ageing population. Wokingham Borough Council is reviewing its day care services for older people who may need some opportunity for social contact and activity during the day. We are trying to think ahead as to what services our residents will need in 5-10 years' time and to help with this, we are seeking the views from various Forums.

Many older people remain physically well and have good social contact where they live. But a number will become frail and may need assistance with care; others may develop some form of dementia. Some will have carers, some not.

Currently the Community Care Departments spend some £560,000 on services for older people who are physically frail, £135,000 for individuals with dementia and some £50,000 on prevention services. Prevention services include working with individuals in the community who may be isolated or setting up satellite services in areas with few local voluntary services. These services are aimed at older people who do not need to be in a day care setting, but who perhaps need some activity during the day to help them stay healthy or to have some social contact.

The Community Care Services fund exercise classes for older people and employ two Occupational Therapists to give talks to groups about diet, exercise, safety and equipment in the home.

Speed Surveys

After the Council recently carried out speed surveys in Hurst, the officer's report stated:

'The speed surveys show that most of the roads have an average speed at approximately the plated speed limit, which is what is expected. However, the A321 does have average speeds slightly above the plated limit. When the average speeds are higher than the plated speed limit, the Personal Injury Accident record is assessed to find out if the higher speeds are causing accidents. The accident database does show that there have been accidents in Hurst village; however, speed was only the listed causation factor in two of them.'

A full accident printout for the last three years for the whole of Hurst was not available at the meeting.

The Council has a traffic calming policy. However, for traffic calming a pattern of speed-related personal injury accidents needs to be identified. In line with Department for Transport [DfT] guidance, four personal injury accidents over the previous three years are the usual criteria. The accident database goes back to 1999.

No good news to report, I'm afraid. Wokingham Borough Council are still dragging their heels on allowing us to complete the work we started last summer. Hopefully by the next edition the "Jobsworth" at WBC will have agreed to give us permission to tidy up their land...!

Traffic and Speed

During December seven speed/traffic strips were distributed around the village to record the speeds/volume of traffic in the key areas identified by our recent petition to the Council. Initial feedback was received by the action group, which included Annette Drake and myself. Now we are waiting for a meeting with Highways to review the group's areas of concern.

We have discussed improving the junction at School Road/A321 to allow children to cross safely. We have also discussed village entrance signs requesting people to 'Kill their speed', along with making all roads 30mph. As with the School Road issues, WBC does not move fast and I will keep you posted on the results.

Dog fouling - School Road playing field

I have raised this issue in the last three editions. We still have a problem with dogs fouling in the play area and adjacent field used by our children. Two doggy waste bins are especially provided and paid for by the Parish Council. If this continues, the Council will have no choice but to BAN DOGS from the park. We will continue to monitor the situation and take the necessary action.

PLASTIC BAGS

According to the Department of Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, shoppers in the UK get through 13,000 carrier bags in their lifetime. In 2008 alone, 9.9 billion carrier bags were distributed -- enough to fill 188 Olympic swimming pools. If laid end to end, they would reach to the moon and back seven times.

Whatever the statistics, plastic bags cause serious pollution of the environment.

Plastic shopping bags are made from polyethylene: a thermoplastic made from oil.

The BBC has announced that China will be banning shops from handing out free plastic bags from June this year in a bid to curb pollution. Instead, people will be encouraged to use baskets or reusable cloth bags for their shopping. Due to the ban on free plastic bags, it is estimated that China will save 37 million barrels of oil per year.

'It is part of a larger area of undeveloped land which provides an attractive open setting to Hurst and maintains the rural character of the wider area. Whilst not designated as a gap between settlements, this area of undeveloped, open land retains a particularly attractive pastoral appearance and provides visual separation between loose knit areas of housing which surround it to the north, east and south.' – S J Turner RIBA MRTPI IHBC

It is pleasing to note that these words reinforce and transcend the basis of refusing a succession of planning applications. With your continuing support, long may they continue to be acknowledged and acted upon by WBC.

Not surprisingly, WBC's refusal in December to grant outline planning approval for the development of Sandford Farm is now the subject of a planning appeal. Despite publicly veiled threats of alternative developments within Hurst as a consequence of supporting the refusal of this planning application, HVS remains undeterred in supporting this refusal.

To be clear, this pending planning appeal is not just a Woodley issue, it is a very real threat to the infrastructure, environment and community of Hurst.

In acknowledging your support and our collective successes to date, in order to influence planning outcomes we cannot afford to become complacent ... please continue with that support!

At the beginning of 1946 we had been working in Belsen Concentration Camp for three months when I was given some leave. We were flown back in a bare Dakota and it was very uncomfortable

Well, finally I arrived at Twyford Station, complete with the ridiculous gas mask and appalling tin hat. There was Mr Huggins, the Station Master who always wore a rose in his buttonhole, and we nearly fell on each other's necks. It was a lovely fine day and as I walked up the little passageway to the bridge I thought, 'This is remarkable, nothing has changed.'

I walked on down to Stanlake and it all looked beautiful. A funny thing used to happen on the hill at Stanlake. By June or July, every year there used to be a sort of plague of little, itsy-bitsy frogs who would go across the hill in waves like lemmings. Sure enough, there they were, my little friends, and I thought, 'Well, this is really it. I am going back to find nothing has changed.'

But of course I was very wrong for things had changed. We had all changed and Stanlake most certainly had. Life during the 'austerity years' was difficult but we struggled on until my father's death. Stanlake was sold and we left the much-loved place to its new owners. The end of an era for me but the beginning of a new one, which has been just as happy and full of fun and laughter.

Village Tales

Effie Barker recalls Stanlake

Excerpts from a talk given by Miss Barker in 1978 and reproduced with the kind permission of the Twyford & Ruscombe Local History Society

My very first memories of Twyford were its smells; the burning hooves at Mr Bill Burton's smithy; the waxed leather thread at Mr Seymour's saddlery and harness-maker's shop; the cough mixture at Mr Brooker's that seemed to pervade the whole village street and last, but not least, I remember the things called 'gob stoppers' from Miss Trewin, who had a shop which could produce anything from an elephant to a pin.

Stanlake really lived on and for horses. There were horses of all shapes, sizes and descriptions. I remember Mr Saunders, the butcher, had a marvellous cob. Well, I got into the most awful trouble one day because while Mr Saunders was inside delivering the meat, I unhitched the pony from the cart and got on its back and it promptly ran away with me – back to Twyford.

The greatest childhood excitement was when the lake froze. Everybody came and the lake was black with people. We had a lovely time with roasted potatoes and everything. But the great thing was on the 'melt' day, when Father would organise an ice hockey match because he loved to see the first person go splash in the lake. It was perfectly safe, of course, as it was only two feet deep – but it was great, great fun.

The excitement of the entertainments in Twyford was intense – particularly those at the Assembly Rooms which smelt of cheese or drains. There was an orchestra, with Mrs Young playing the piano. The local policemen were also great friends. They had lovely belts with large lamps on them.

About this time – the mid-'Thirties – Stanlake was in its heyday. There was lots of entertaining and games

Then came the 'phoney' war and the arrival of the evacuees. One famous morning we went to Twyford Station with the wagon and horses to meet the evacuees allocated to Stanlake. The whole idea was that we were going to prevent them from being bombed to death, but of course they were just *bored* to death.

I then joined the Land Army. Oh, those breeches ... and that hat! I had the job of running a market garden at Woodley Aerodrome.

As for the Home Guard – you know 'Dad's Army' on television, don't you? Well, we were the original Dad's Army. Do you remember in 'Dad's Army' when they thought there was a German paratrooper coming down and it was only a swan? Well, that actually happened here.

Well, that was really the beginning of the end for Stanlake. The war split the family up. My brothers were away at the war. I joined the Red Cross and went to Europe with a unit known as the Civilian Relief Unit, attached directly to the Army, to help with some of the unpleasant things that they knew were going.
