TURNING POINT FOR HURST

Development of Sandford Farm has been granted outline planning permission. This will mean over 600 dwellings being built to the west of Hurst. In addition, consultation is now taking place regarding the North Wokingham urban development opposite Cantley Park. This entails the building of 1,500 dwellings and the creation of a major junction on the crossroads of Forest Road and A321.

There will potentially be 2,000 new houses on either side of the village.

Building work at Cantley Park will probably start in March 2011 – in about a year's time. Crucially, we are at the centre point for through traffic from both the Sandford Farm development and the North Wokingham development.

Hurst could end up by being little more than a through road and we will lose all of the spirit and character of the village.

SANDFORD FARM

Inspector Recommends Approval

Loddon Valley Action Group report as follows.

The Planning Inspector has recommended to the Secretary of State that outline planning permission be granted for the development of Sandford Farm.

We now await the Secretary of State's decision on or before 31st March 2010, pending agreement of a Section 106 Condition between the developer and Wokingham Borough Council. However, as the Secretary of State is 'minded to agree with the Inspector', it is almost inevitable that outline planning permission will be granted to excavate the landfill site and build over 500 urban-style residences in this rural location.

Dangers in excavating toxic waste

The Loddon Valley Action Group are extremely disappointed that grave concerns regarding the excavation of toxic waste and its processing, by unproven methods and so close to homes, hardly merit a mention in the Inspector's report. LVAG gave evidence that the amount of waste infill to be excavated and 'sorted' on site is **three** times the quantity reported by the developer and accepted by WBC. In other words, rather than the proposed four-year scheme, residents would have to endure the process for more than 12 years. The alternative would be to 'speed up' the remediation, which would impose greater environmental health and safety risks. Clearly, the developer will be motivated by cost savings and a faster return on investment.

LVAG approached WBC to ask who would be liable for any shortcomings in the remediation of the land (in particular the health and safety of the public during and after the remediation). Their response was that it is the developer who has a duty of care in the implementation of the development. As the developer and current landowner are both registered outside the legal jurisdiction of the UK, it is amazing that WBC have not insisted on a bond or insurance scheme to cover the risks of environmental disaster or the site being left part-remediated.

What happens next?

LVAG have written to the Secretary of State reiterating the public's extreme concern that the planning process has not been adequately addressed.

In anticipation of the Secretary of State allowing the Appeal and granting outline planning consent, LVAG will continue to engage with local communities and remain fully involved in the planning process via contact with the Environment Agency and WBC.

The HVS are actively liaising with LVAG and will continue to support them in the campaign against the development of Sandford Farm. It is important that we all continue to register our concerns with WBC Councillors, Parish Councils, MPs, and the Environment Agency.

The Castle

The sub-tenants of The Castle in Church Hill vacated the building at the end of the year. They will be missed by many in the village who appreciated The Castle's good food and warm welcome. The trustees are advertising for a new company to take over the tenancy but, in the meantime, Greene King will continue to care for the buildings and is expected to reopen for service shortly.

North Wokingham Development opposite Cantley Park The future of Hurst

Wokingham is facing a major expansion as plans for four extended communities are finalised. Thousands of new homes will be built in four key locations: north of Wokingham (1,500), south of Wokingham (2,500), Arborfield Garrison (3,500) and south of the M4 (2,500).

In north Wokingham, the 1,500 dwellings will be built on a site opposite Cantley Park. This development will have a huge impact on Hurst.

Outline planning has already been granted for the site to be developed. However, formal consultation is taking place from 9th February to 23rd March to decide how all the sites will evolve. Once the consultation closes on 23rd March, all comments received will be carefully evaluated by council planners who will then draw up the final plans for consideration by the council's decision-making executive on 27th May.

What will this mean for Hurst?

The concern for us is how the volume of traffic will affect Hurst. 1,500 properties in north Wokingham will mean an increase in traffic of up to 4,800 extra vehicles on the roads coming from the new development. Add this to the increased number of vehicles from the Sandford Farm development of over 500 houses. We leave you to imagine the picture. The plans show a proposed relief road with a roundabout on Forest Road and A321, the **Ashridge Interchange**.

Broadly speaking, for vehicles going from Wokingham towards Reading, at present it is possible to take the A329 or to go through Hurst and Twyford via the A321 to the A4. With the proposed roundabout on the Forest Road, there is no road west towards Reading. Vehicles coming from the new development would be faced with the prospect of turning east, going all the way along to the Coppid Beech roundabout and then doubling back onto the motorway. Is this likely to happen? For people working in Reading, the obvious choice would be to go through Hurst and Twyford or the A321, Church Hill and Sandford Lane.

Have your say

The Design Supplementary Planning Document [SPD]

The SPD will ensure designs of high quality for new residential development in the Borough until 2026.

The Core Strategy

Comments on the four sites chosen for development between now and 2026 will be received until 23rd March 2010. I hope that everyone affected by the proposed changes will comment.

The link to the Community Development Consultation is: www.wokingham.gov.uk/council/news-events/latest-news/community-development-consultation

The maps are exhibited at the Council, the Libraries and on the Internet.

Hurst will be affected by the proposals for North Wokingham. These include a Northern Relief Road. This road will give western access from the A329 at Ashridge via Bell Foundry Lane through to Coppid Beech roundabout towards Bracknell. The Ministry of Transport did not allow other accesses due to the proximity of the A329 to the M4.

The principle underpinning of the Core Strategy is that the majority of new development to 2026 will be located in four Strategic Development locations. This is in order to safeguard existing residential areas, which have suffered from a significant amount of piecemeal back garden development placing a strain on local infrastructure whilst contributing little to improve it. This approach will also protect most of the country-side and ensure that the development provides for high levels of infrastructure.

Problems experienced by the adverse weather A few facts!

To have kept all the roads in the borough clear during the recent severe weather would have cost an estimated £2.3million.

To have kept all the pavements and walk-ways clear during the recent severe weather would have cost an estimated $\pounds 1.5$ million.

To have kept all the car parks clear would have cost an estimated £750,000.

More than 2,000 tonnes of grit/salt were used.

200 miles of road were covered at each gritting across the borough.

Total estimated cost to the taxpayer if these had been done is at least £5million, which equates to a **council tax increase of 7 per cent !!**

Hypodermic needles have been found to the rear of School Road play area in Hurst.

We continue to work with residents and Wokingham Borough Council community wardens to resolve these isolated incidents. We will, of course, continue to maintain high visibility patrols in the area.

Empty Car Campaign

We've also had reports of a theft from a motor vehicle parked in Hurst Village Hall car park. Theft from vehicles is becoming an issue of concern across the Wokingham area. The neighbourhood team are now involved in the Empty Car Campaign. Local History Project

Over the last few years, Hurst resident, John Terry, spent a huge amount of time researching the lives of the men named on our Village War Memorial at St Nicholas church. Despite his deteriorating health, John compiled a magnificent collection of biographies of the forty local men from the Great War named on the memorial, as well as details of a further sixty men who fought in the conflict. Their stories graphically illustrate the heroism and horror of the First World War and provide a fascinating insight into many of the major campaigns.

With the help of Duncan Kendall, this research has been published on a web site www.warmemorial.org.uk in memory of the soldiers from Hurst who gave their lives.
