SCHOOL ROAD PLAY EQUIPMENT

I would like to thank all those who took the time to join us at our Open Afternoon for the consultation on the play equipment at the School Road site. Over 130 people completed our questionnaire. The result was 70% in favour and 30% against. That said, the residents who live around the park were very much against the project and the Parish Council had to take their concerns seriously in coming to a decision not to allow the project to go ahead.

We are now in communication with Wokingham Borough Council. We have looked at other sites in Hurst. The one that looks most favourable at the moment is Dinton Pastures, which, as you may all be aware, is still within our parish.

We hope that discussions with WBC will lead us to making some major improvements to the football pitch in School Road, where we want to level the land and put in new goal posts and nets. We shall also be making improvements to the large swing that already exists.

The Parish Council feel very let down by the way WBC has conducted this matter. This is the reason why we are trying to get some modifications done to the existing site and to find a solution as to where the new equipment should be sited.

I am very sorry for the 70% who were in favour of installing the new equipment. I must apologise to everybody for any inconvenience caused. I am sure that you will understand that it wasn't on the part of the Parish Council. We have done everything we could to make the best out of a difficult situation.

Core Strategy

The Executive has approved that we do not review our housing numbers and has adopted the Masterplans for North and South Wokingham and the Infrastructure Supplementary Planning Document. The Executive also agreed the revised Masterplan for South M4 for re-consultation in November/December to come back for adoption January/February. The Arborfield Masterplan is on hold pending clarity of the Army's intentions with regard to the garrison, but meanwhile we will continue dialogue with residents over unresolved issues. The Executive confirmed the current policy position about back gardens, density, parking standards and Gypsy, Roma and Traveller pitch provision as per documents brought to the Group.

Martineau Green - the facts

Wokingham District Council (as it was known) sold the field opposite the Village Hall to Bryant Homes in the early 1990s and in 1993 the developer received planning permission for the houses that are now built in Martineau Lane.

As part of the developer's Section 106 obligation, the green in the middle of Martineau Lane was given by Bryant Homes to Wokingham District Council to be used as public open space. The 'green' has never changed ownership since then.

In September this year, a member of the public asked a question about ownership of the green during the public forum part of the Hurst Parish Council's meeting. I was away but the Parish Council asked me to find out from Wokingham Borough Council legal department the exact position regarding the ownership.

The Senior Legal Officer confirmed that Wokingham Borough Council owns the land and the public has permission, albeit general permission, to use the green as public open space. There is no obligation or documented evidence to transfer the land to the Parish Council.

A landowner who fenced off the end of Davis Way in Hurst for personal use has been ordered by the High Court to pay damages and legal costs of at least £19,000 to Wokingham Borough Council. The owners have been warned that if they obstruct or damage Davis Way again, they could be sent to prison.

POLICE REPORT

Many burglaries can be prevented

Police are warning residents to review their home security after two burglaries took place in Twyford where offenders used the letterbox.

- * Keep doors and windows locked at all times.
- * UPVC doors where the letterbox is central are more at risk than doors where letterboxes are located at the bottom.
- * Remove all keys from the locks and keep them in a safe place and out of view.
- * Avoid leaving property like handbags, keys or laptops in hallways, or where they can be seen from outside the house.

Vehicle crime

We are still receiving reports of vehicles being broken into, mainly in car parks. These areas have been added to our patrol plans but it remains the car owner's responsibility to ensure that no property is on show.

Anti-Social Behaviour

Operation Lion Cub continues to run over the weekends (Friday and Saturday eveings 6pm - 2am) and feedback continues to be good from local residents.

Anti-social behaviour can be groups congregating and causing noise, under-age drinking, drug taking, anti-social use of motor vehicles. Ring *0845 8 505 505*.

Speeding

In September, we sent out a request via the local press and Community Messaging for residents' perceptions of speeding in their areas. As you can appreciate, we received a large volume of requests and the team are currently in the planning process to deal with all of your concerns.

Priority is being given to a number of the locations where we shall be conducting an intelligence gathering process with our new hi-tech Speed Indication Device. The SID is not an enforcement tool, but provides information and intelligence to allow us to plan and prepare for further actions in relation to your concerns.

Your relevant Neighbourhood Action Group will discuss the findings. The process from this stage to enforcement will be approximately 2-3 months.

I don't want to raise your hopes for enforcement in all areas mentioned, but we are heading in the right direction.

The colder weather and dark evenings are now upon us so I would stress to all residents and businesses that as the nights draw in, please be extra vigilant with your security checks.

Next month we will have news on who will be replacing PC Terry Neblett and PCSO Anne Chalmers.

The show raises welcome funds for village and other local good causes, including St Nicholas Primary School, the village halls and the guiding and scouting movements. Thousands of pounds have been raised during the history of the show which goes back more than 30 years.

Queen Victoria's Christmas

Last year, Queen Victoria's beautiful winter sleigh was on show in St George's Hall, Windsor, with the traditional Christmas tree from Windsor Great Park.

Queen Victoria and Prince Albert spent many Christmases at the Castle, and the Queen often enjoyed sleigh rides around Windsor during the winter months. The royal sleigh, built by the carriage-makers Hooper & Co, is painted red and gold, and lined with red velvet. The horses pulling it had harnesses decorated with ostrich plumes and silver bells.

An extract from Queen Victoria's journal of 12 February 1855 records a winter outing in the sleigh with Princess Clementine of Orleans.



She wrote: `Another sharp frost and a fine day - Albert drove Clem and me out in the sledge ... with the exception of two or three little places, we went beautifully and as smoothly as though we were on ice. The sun bright and the sky so blue. We were out for an hour.'

The royal couple are closely associated with Christmas traditions.

Prince Albert is credited with popularising decorated fir trees, dressed with coloured wax candles and artificial snow. Gifts, toys and sweets were heaped around the trees or hung on the branches, to be presented on Christmas Eve when the candles were lit. The royal children made homemade cards to give to members of the household, and the family would go skating or play festive games introduced by Prince Albert.

This year at Windsor Castle

To celebrate the Christmas period, the table in the Castle's magnificent State Dining Room will be dressed with pieces from the Minton 'Victoria' dessert service.

The service was purchased by Queen Victoria at the Great Exhibition of 1851, thereafter taking the monarch's name. It attracted much attention at the time and was described by the influential Art Journal as being of 'exceeding beauty'. Porcelain custard cups, bonbon dishes and a centrepiece decorated with seasonal images will be displayed alongside glittering silver-gilt candlesticks and festive fruit and flowers.

It will be on display from 10th December 2010 – 5th January 2011.

A Christmas Carol

Before settling on the name of Tiny Tim for his character in *A Christmas Carol*, Charles Dickens considered three other alliterative names. They were Little Larry, Puny Pete, and Small Sam. Dickens' initial choice for Scrooge's statement `Bah Humbug' was `Bah Christmas'.
