Road Safety

As part of the Parish Council's road safety policy, a vehicle speed survey using SID (Speed Indication Device) was carried out on Broadwater Lane, near the Gospel Hall, on Friday 2nd April. Between 12:00 and 13:00, the speed of 63 vehicles was recorded in this 30 mph zone.

Number of vehicles	Speed
36	36-39mph
23	40-49mph
4	50mph +

The 85 percentile speed was calculated to be 45mph. In view of these very high figures the police have proposed additional future SID visits to this site with police support.

The Parish Council has asked WDC for a SID assessment to be carried out for their vehicle activated sign (VAS) programme at other sites. These are: Lodge Road, Hinton Road and the A321 to the south of the village. An update on the VAS programme is due from WDC's Highways Board in July.

Local Nature Reserves

The Parish Council has written to a local landowner to explore the possibility of designating some of their land for a Local Nature Reserve (LNR). As this is a big step for the landowner to take it will be some time before we get a formal reply. In the meantime the Parish Council is making further enquiries with English Nature and other Parish Councils who have been through the process of designating an LNR.

The Parish Council is keen to know both the positive and negative aspects and it is essential that we gain sufficient knowledge of the costs and liabilities before committing public money to this project. It is clear that, should this project go ahead, we will require the assistance of many people to manage, maintain and fund the LNR's upkeep. It should be noted, however, there remain a number of residents who object to the Community Shelter and have made their views known at the meetings held by the Parish Council and directly to the HVS Committee.

Youth Provision

The popular Mobile Youth Facility will continue to meet at the Village Hall car park on alternate Tuesday and Friday evenings from 7:00 to 9:30pm, but will switch to the School Road recreation ground when necessary work has been completed.

Village Clean-up

The Parish Council would like to thank all those who took part in the annual village clean-up. A record number of helpers collected nearly four skips of rubbish with many unusual items being found. The waste team at WDC arranges for the removal of rubbish dumped on roads, verges and footways, so please report any incidents to WDC on **0118 974 6340**. Please also report anyone you suspect of dumping rubbish to either the Environment Agency on **01276 454300** or WDC on **0118 974 6307** or **6339**.

WDC has a hotline (0118 974 6307) for residents to report incidents of graffiti on private property which will be removed or covered free of charge by the Council's street cleansing contractor.

Call for an even cleaner Hurst!

While we reached record numbers taking part in the annual village clean up, we felt it important to include an extract from an email the Committee recently received from a regular visitor to Hurst:

".. This was my fourth visit to Hinton Road in the past six years and I write to you to express my dismay at the way in which pride in your environment has gone right down since my last visit.

"Imagine my dismay when I found most of your beautiful walking trails and pavements befouled with dog poo, old gear boxes, refrigerators, microwave ovens, stoves, general rubbish and even bags of everyday household garbage. People are using Hurst as a dumping ground and your residents walking their dogs are carrying doggy poo bags for show—not for picking up the poo.

"To say I was disgusted was an understatement. The worst walk was down to the ford. I cannot believe that people can so harm the environment in which they live. Furthermore, I cannot believe that a Council such as yours allows this filth to collect and grow in volume to the extent that it has.

"You need an education programme for your residents and some system whereby the need to dump household appliances by the side of the road is not necessary. Furthermore, you need to do something about cleaning up the mess that is already there.

"I hope that you manage to do something—my next visit to Hurst will be in September. Will I see an improvement? I hope so."

While this may seem hard hitting, it is clear that this particular visitor to our village feels that the environment is being spoiled. The HVS Committee is keen to support the Parish Council in countering any littering and dumping problems and would like to encourage sensible disposal of rubbish and the use of the Parish Council's incident and help lines given above. Let's work together to ensure this visitor's return to Hurst is a more pleasant experience.

Speeding traffic

The Chief Constable of Thames Valley Police has replied to my letter in which you may recall that I asked him to be aware of our disquiet about the speeding traffic on our village roads.

His reply is very positive. The guidance on the use of speed cameras is being revised nationally, and there may be some flexibility to deploy more speed cameras or mobile speed enforcement teams at sites that fall below the current threshold. This threshold relates to the number of crashes and fatal accidents on the site.

This is truly good news – it seems ridiculous that unless there are fatalities we cannot get action from the police on traffic calming! The Chief Constable has forwarded his letter to Inspector Lindsay Finch, the Neighbourhood Inspector for Wokingham, who will meet with us to discuss the problems of speeding traffic in Hurst.

Tape Lane

The new access onto Tape Lane which is causing much consternation and anxiety to residents in Tape Lane, and all who fear the not very well hidden agenda of the owner of the land. Many have written to the planning department and the enforcement team, and now the arboriculture officer has also been alerted. The news I have from the officers has now changed! This access requires planning permission because it opens on to an adopted road and does not serve any permitted development.

Planning permission is required to remove a hedge under the Hedgerows Regulations 1997, which states:

- It is against the law to remove most countryside hedgerows without permission
- You must write to your local planning authority
- If the authority decides to prohibit removal of an important hedgerow it must let you know within 6 weeks
- If you remove the hedgerow without permission (whether important or not) you may face an unlimited fine. You may also have to replace the hedgerow.

Many thanks to those of you who have helped to get this matter properly investigated by the officers of the Council. We now have the opportunity to fight this battle. Once again we act together against unauthorised goings-on!

Clearing Ditches

I have had no response from my questions as to whether anyone else needs their ditches cleared. I thought that if several residents clubbed together, they would get a better deal from a contractor for the work. My ditches need excavating, do yours?

Crime Report from Wpc Sandy Craske

The Use of Lines Road as a cut-through for commuter traffic is being looked into, but I am conscious that it could put a lot more traffic through School Road. What I plan to do is to go to the area and note all vehicles that pass. I will then send a letter to each of the owners, indicating that the vehicle was seen to be using that road and requesting that they notify the driver and request they respect the "access only" signs.

I have passed the **Green Man public house** on several occasions but have not found any vehicles blocking the footpath. Perhaps I have not been there at the right time and will bear this in mind on my travels.

Crime update: during March we have had only one instance of a dwelling burglary; better than in February. However, Hurst has been hit very badly for garage, shed and outbuilding break-ins. A total of 8 have been reported and a variety of equipment has been stolen, including hand tools, electric tools, petrol and a generator. In relation to these break-ins, we have been handed a Master 800 Workbench which was left near the scene of a break-in; so far we have been unable to trace the owner. If anyone knows the owner, please contact me. There have been two incidents of vehicles being broken into and also one reported theft of a motor vehicle which was found in Caversham the next day.

Dunt Lane: reports of youths drinking and drug taking in this area have been made, but once again I have not seen anyone at that location when I have been there (never in the right place at the right time!).
