St Nicholas East Wall Update

You may have seen the latest public notice outside the church about the East Wall, pointing out that the St Nicholas Hurst Parochial Church Council is applying to the Diocese for a faculty to investigate and repair some of the wall, coping and apex crosses and flashing. This lower-key approach will allow the finances to be understood and managed more easily when we embark on the later phase. It will also allow some repairs to be undertaken to reduce water penetration.

If you wish to see the detail, the papers are available in the church. Work is expected to commence in May.

In the meantime, we have carried out the monitoring of readings on the East Wall for over a year, and this will continue for a further 4 years at least. This is to understand the nature of the movement, i.e. is it progressive or seasonal? To date it seems to be seasonal, but time will tell. It will also enable us to check that any activities or repair work do not adversely affect the movement or introduce instability.

Hurst Baby & Toddler Group

Do you look after children under 4 and have a free Wednesday morning? If so why not come and join us at Hurst's busy Baby & Toddler group. Everyone is welcome including parents, carers, nannies, grandparents and childminders.

Each week we have a variety of stimulating toys for all ages, a home corner, dressing up, play dough, a book corner, and ride-on toys. There is also a separate baby area for non-walkers. We try to include a group activity such as singing every week towards the end of the session, and there is a small video and cassette library with young children's titles.

We have a number of different visitors to the sessions including a photographer, someone who does hand and foot imprints, children's book sellers, toy stalls and Phoenix cards. We are closely linked to the St. Nicholas Pre-School Playgroup and we share in some of its fund-raising activities and trips. Up and coming events include a sponsored 'toddle' in the summer to raise funds for Barnardo's and the Toddler Group.

We meet every Wednesday from 10am to 12 noon in the Large Village Hall in Hurst. This includes school holidays, although we are closed between Christmas and New Year. We charge £2.00 for you and your first child plus 50p for each additional child over six months old. The price includes tea or coffee for the adults and squash and a biscuit for the children.

St Nicholas Pre-School Playgroup

Did you know there is a thriving Playgroup in Hurst?

Our pre-school provides places for all 3-5 year olds in Hurst and the surrounding area. We are open five days a week (mornings 9 - 11.30am, lunch club 11.30 - 12.30, and afternoons 12.30 - 3pm) and we meet in the Small Village Hall. Our Breakfast Club, known as the 'Wakey Wakey Club', is from 8am for 4 to 11 year olds and includes walking children to the Primary School.

We have very high standards and aim to send all our children off to primary school as happy, well-balanced individuals who enjoy learning and face challenges with enthusiasm and confidence.

Our curriculum follows the Early Learning Goals set out by the Department of Education and we have already passed three Ofsted inspections with flying colours. We offer 'freeplay' sessions for 3-5 year olds where the emphasis is on learning through play. We also have smaller, more structured sessions to encourage pre-reading and writing skills, plus concentration and perseverance. Each term has a theme and there are related trips out and special visitors - a recent favourite being a visit from a local vet.

We are proud of our ratio of one adult to six children. Each funded child has a key worker which means our professional staff are dedicated to the needs and development of each child. Local History and Parish Register

We are really excited that local historian Henry Farrar has allowed us to publish on our website (www.hvs.org.uk) his wonderful "CD-ROM of Hurst". This in-depth history of our village and surrounding area has been updated and made available as an online resource.

The website also includes entries from the Hurst Parish Register, detailing Births, Marriages and Deaths in the village from the mid 1500s to the late 19th Century. This has been made possible by a mammoth feat of perseverance by Henry Farrar who acquired several shoeboxes full of index cards and typed in all of these records. We believe that we are one of the first parishes in the country to have such comprehensive records available on-line.

Parish Council News

Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS):

The Installation of Vehicle Activated signs for Hurst moved a step closer thanks to the efforts of the Parish Council, the Village Society and District Councillor Annette Drake.

In December, Wokingham District Council wrote to the Parish Council with a proposal to provide two VAS on the A321; one outside the Elephant and Castle and one outside Woodlands Cottages on the approach to Orchard Road. As part of the proposal, the Parish Council was asked to fund one of the signs, estimated at £7,000 which they were able to agree to once the Village Society generously offered to provide 50% of this £7,000 funding.

At the highways Board meeting on 7th February, it was agreed that the Board would advise the WDC Executive to approve Hurst, along with 8 other locations in the District to undergo further assessment for VAS. The investment will involve a 7 day, 24 hour speed survey at the chosen location and a more detailed cost estimate and implementation plan. Once the assessment is complete, a full proposal will be put to the Highways Board.

Parish Design Statement (PDS):

This seems to be moving slowly forward after further consultation with developers and their ilk was suggested by Wokingham District Council and this has taken place during January. We now believe that the PDS will be considered by the March executive meeting at WDC.

Mobile Youth Provision:

This has moved into the Village Hall until the weather improves. The times are 7:15-9:45pm every Tuesday. Debbie is currently planning a programme to accommodate young people's requests. Please come along and support this venture. You can contact **Debbie on 0118 934 0221**.

Village Clean-up:

View from Shute End Wokingham Unitary Councillor, Annette Drake, reports:

The South East Area Plan:

The consultation period for The South East Local Plan which will govern economic growth across the South East for the next twenty years is from 24th January to 15th April 2005.

The South East Regional Assembly (SEEDA) formulates the plan, which sets out policy proposals for the region, the counties of Buckinghamshire, Kent, Hampshire, East & West Sussex, Surrey, Oxfordshire and Berkshire.

The proposal is talking about huge numbers of houses for the South East to be built at very high densities and with very restricted parking allowances in residential areas, designed to encourage us to use public transport. Although encouragement to use alternative methods to the car where possible is laudable, car ownership is not going to decrease and the cars need somewhere to park

A questionnaire will be sent to every household in the region asking for views on the three levels of proposed housing growth from 25,000 and 28,000 to 32,000 houses per year in the region from 2006 to 2026. A previous proposal approved by the assembly's regional planning committee backed targets between the regional planning guidance (RPG) rate at 29,500 and 36,000 homes a year. We already suffer from an infrastructure problem and it is unlikely that contributions from developers will provide the necessary schools, roads, doctors and other community facilities. There will be pressure on all utilities, particularly water.

We have the opportunity to express our views, and I urge you to respond to the consultation. Reasonable numbers of houses, and a properly planned expansion should be the way forward, with Councils making the decision, not SEEDA an unelected body.

Budget time:

Is here again and every item of expenditure is scrutinised in the run up to the Full Council meeting the aim is to keep council tax rises at about the rate of inflation for the next 3 years. The budget proposals will be announced & debated on at the full Council on 24th February when the Council tax will be set.

One of the items, which caused residents unrest this month, was a review of Concessionary Fare Scheme. The result of consultation has concluded that the tokens were very popular and should continue to be available. The solution which the Executive of the Council arrived at was to produce a locally manufactured token to replace the national tokens, these will be of a light weight plastic, at a cost of approx £15,000 and will be distributed by post, (no more queuing in Village Halls) the cost of these tokens will be paid by the Council only when they are used; this will reduce what has otherwise been an increasing annual cost.

Hurst Pantomime Group Snow White ~ A review by Sue Corcoran

Banter and heckling from the audience reached a new rollicking high as audiences entered into the spirit of Hurst's panto Snow White. Hurst Pantomime Group's production had all the magic ingredients of a traditional panto along with buckets of talent, enthusiasm and liveliness.

Every one of the cast shone. Florence Tavener, just 13 years old, had a calm confidence and strong but sweet voice. Judith Boulton had excellent timing and diction as the wicked Queen Maligna. She expertly bounced back audience banter with witty ad libs.

Jo Penney has cornered the market in fairy godmothers. Her portrayal of Fairy Thistledown's gentle commonsense was a worthy successor to her part in the group's Cinderella two years ago.

A talented threesome of Brian Colman (also of HVS fame) as Chuckles, Tim Taylor as Dame Goodheart and Tony Pouncey as Alonzo, provided much merriment as they romped through the show. Laura Hiles was a strong and dashing Prince Michael who went on of course to win his bride. Keith Milner played a menacing Black-hearted Jake.

Lightning the pantomime horse was a triumph. Rod King and John Penney, inside the skin, managed to convey an amazingly wide range of emotions – and create many laughs.

The seven miners, as the dwarves were dubbed for the show, were played by Georgia Leigh, Holly Briggs, Victoria Timmins, Rebecca Boulton, Ryan Marner, Phoebe Leigh and Ben Connor. Their strong acting and singing skills were among the panto's highlights.

Director Peter Stallwood, a former artistic director of Wokingham Theatre, wove the cast together to produce a sparkling show that kept its pace going throughout. Steve Randall's indefatigable work as musical director was highly effective.

The sets by Terry Bunyard, Eddie Coe (also of HVS fame), Geoff King, Carole King, Naomi Bassett and Jane Fiennes were excellent. Janet Larkin, Joyce and Beryl Spear, Susan Rockall and Jane Carr produced colourful and attractive costumes.

A whole army of other people were involved in many other roles behind the scenes for the panto which had four performances at Hurst Village Hall in January.

A power cut towards the end of the Friday evening performance was not allowed to spoil the show. Resourceful members of the lighting crew (including our own Duncan Kendall) and the audience shone torches onto the stage to make sure everyone could see the cast, undeterred, singing the final song.

This was the group's second panto. It was a truly village event which the village will surely wish to see as a fixture in its calendar.
